According to our solicitor, her father would have to agree to this by himself but sadly he would not understand what was happening so PoA could not be achieved. It was asked how many other

members had PoA set up, with about 50% saying Yes. It was advisable that everyone sought PoA before it was 'too late'.

3 – Fran had said that she had recently had Covid and spent a few days in hospital and it had taken the 'stuffing out of her', Many of the members reiterated this and said that a lot had lost all strength and it takes a long time to get over any ailment that a 'normal' person would easily 'shake off'. 4 – Future meetings, Dave asked if everyone was happy to have the next meeting as a Zoom one but most felt they would prefer a face-to-face meeting at GAC even though it costs more and the weather could be bad. Starting an hour earlier did help and by the time we meet again, probably in early February, things might not be too bad.

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Volunteers Zoom 10/12/24

During December I attended a Zoom meeting, set up by AUK, for Self Help groups and Branch leaders. Some of the interesting things discussed are noted here:-

- They liked the idea of us donating our end-of-year account surplus money to the BigGive during December, so doubling the money and adding gift aid.
- Most groups/branches enjoyed the conversation side of the meet, thus helping one another.
- Though groups/branches have several members, often above 30 or more, on average only about 5-20 attend meetings.

- The pandemic cut numbers down and many are housebound.
- Ataxia is not known of by many GP's. One example was an ataxian changed doctors, the new one asked what ataxia was?
- 70% of benefit claims for ataxians are rejected, AUK can help many appeal through the Helpline.

Also, during December I attended a virtual meeting with Prof. M. Hadjivassiliou at Sheffield Hallamshire Teaching Hospital, where the Ataxia Clinic is, along with other doctors and ataxia sufferers known to the Prof. The aim was to get an update on the research the Sheffield team had done and how ataxians could help.

We were told about the drug <u>Skyclarys</u> and how it may slow or prevent the progression of FA, research is ongoing.

The Mitochondria in cells are affected and these provide the energy we require for everyday living. They are trying different drugs to see if there is any change, often drugs that were used to treat other conditions like Parkinsons may help.

It was also asked if anyone was willing to volunteer to go through movement test, example being could they get on to an examination table or chair.

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From Personal Experience

As mentioned in my 'Ditherings' I thought I would share an experience that occurred and I had not planned for even though I thought I had a 'master-plan' for every event???

On New Years Eve after attending a family funeral we [Sue & I] were not in the mood to go out celebrating and with bad weather forecast, a quiet night in looked the best option. Settling down on my riser/recliner chair with my legs and feet up, as advised by the doctor to reduce swelling, we watched TV. Low and behold at 9.15pm the lights flickered twice and then complete darkness, and I mean black, as the electric went off. Our comments to one another were 'how long will this be' and as we sat there unable to see each other, reality set in. Sue felt her way too the kitchen to get a torch that we always leave on the worktop for said emergency's. Returning with the light source, we were able to locate a battery operated 'candle' that provided sufficient light to see in the room.

Then reality, really set in, when I realised that of all my batteryoperated equipment, stair lift, emergency lift cushion [Elk] and mobile hoist would work, my Riser/Recliner chair wouldn't! There I was, laid back with my legs in the air, STUCK. After a few frantic minutes of trying, I was unable to move and I started to think would I be here until the electricity supply was returned? Further thoughts went through my mind, should I need to go to the toilet with my legs in the air, water does not run uphill.

Something had to be done with whatever was available, with all of this, our phone kept ringing telling me my electric was off and being a person of priority, they would get the supply on asap, I knew that! Train of thought was to get my mobile hoist and lift myself out, imagine all this in relative darkness, but we persevered with relative success and as many of you know these excellent hoists do not run easily on a carpet so it was a matter of getting my wheelchair as close as possible to the R/R.

Safely deposited onto my wheelchair a great relief set in and we sat there in near silence as we didn't have a battery radio, 'it's on the 'to-do list'. Within half an hour the supply returned and the 'status-que' returned.

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FAXNAX Recipe [a bit late!]

A Christmas Yule Log with a difference.....

1 Packet Chocolate Chip Cookies 1⁄2 Pint Whipped Cream Sherry

METHOD

Dip each biscuit into the sherry..... (not through the neck of the bottle 3)


And sandwich together with the whipped cream to for a log shape. (do not leave the biscuits to soak in the Sherry for too long, as they will become soggy and unmanageable)......(*same could be said of the Cook*)

Pour any remaining Sherry over the log – <u>please note</u>: the recipe doesn't say what quantity of Sherry should be used!

Cover the Log with remaining Whipped Cream and decorate with chocolate flake or grated chocolate and Glace Cherries.
